Scottish Hazards Conference 2012

The annual Scottish Hazards Conference was held on Thursday 15 November 2012 at the STUC. It was attended by more than 100 delegates. Delegates heard from John Finnie, MSP for Highlands and Islands and a member of the Justice Committee and Lewis MacDonald, Shadow Cabinet Secretary for Justice. They heard 'Voices from the Shop Floor' - H&S activists across industrial sectors, unions and workplace issues; and, most importantly, they heard from each other about health and safety action delegates are taking in workplaces across Scotland. 28th Anniversary of the Bhopal Disaster

The 3rd of December is the 28th anniversary of the 1984 Bhopal Gas Leak which is now thought to have killed at least 25,000 people. Survivors of the disaster and those born since then continue to suffer from the effects of the gas and from the toxins still leaking from the factory site into Bhopal's water. Bhopali's continue their inspirational struggle for clean water, for good and free health care, for the site to be cleaned up, for compensation and for Dow Chemical to accept responsibility for all of this.

In September, the Scottish Friends of Bhopal and others organised a Bhopal Survivor's Tour in Scotland, England and Ireland. A report of that Tour can be found here.

One of the various initiatives that have grown out of the Tour is the *Dow - Have a Heart Campaign*. Those of you who met Safreen, one of those who came on the Tour and one of the founders of Children Against Dow, will have heard her story about Bhopal Children sending the Indian Prime Minister a heart since he appeared to have none! The Dow - Have a Heart campaign has grown from this. There is a new <u>website for this campaign</u>. We are asking everyone in the Hazards Campaign to mark the Anniversary in some way - one good one would be to send Have a Heart cards to Dow!

New call for action by the Alliance for Cancer Prevention

A dramatic policy switch to eliminate exposure to Endocrine Disrupting Chemicals (EDCs) must be the main focus of the EU's EDC strategy (1) currently being reviewed in order to address the shocking levels of breast cancer caused by work. The Alliance for Cancer Prevention demands a refocus of the EDC strategy in the wake of new research which shows working in certain jobs can elevate women's breast cancer risk. The international case control study (2) led by the University of Stirling's Occupational and Environmental Health and Safety Research Group (OEHRG) found that women working for 10 years in jobs classified as highly exposed increased their breast cancer risk by 42 per cent.
